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Chichester Youth Adventure Trust Annual Report 2020

Public Benefit Declaration

The Trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Our charity's aim is to help and educate young people through their leisure time or educational activities.

Continued work has been undertaken at the bunkhouse to improve the accommodation and to ensure the health and safety requirements are met.

The CV-19 pandemic has and will continue to restrict the bunkhouse being used for residential stays during 2021. The Trustees are looking into alternative day uses for the site for young people in the local area. The young people not only experience and develop skills in the outdoors, but also develop their independence and their social skills whilst away from home and living with others. The Trustees will continue to monitor the usage to ensure young people benefit from using and staying at the bunkhouse.

There are also a number of adult groups who use the bunkhouse when it is available, and their revenue assists with the day to day expenses of running the place, enabling the young people to stay at the centre at a reduced price.

The following reports incorporate how the charity continues to meet its aim.

Report of the Trustees

Chair's Report

The CV- 19 pandemic has had a massive affect upon all aspects of our lives and the bunkhouse, being situated in a high-risk area of Wales, has been particularly vulnerable to the stringent restrictions imposed on self-catering and hostel type accommodation. This has resulted in partial closure in the early days and total closure at a later stage.

Measures have, however, been taken by the trustees to ensure that all required standards, including hygiene and layout, are in place to ensure that the bunkhouse is safe when in use. Most of the bookings from March to December were cancelled and, due to lock down restrictions and uncertainties in both Wales and England, we were unable to take new onesnot that anyone was wanting to use the place anyway! A further stringent lock down has now been imposed for the whole of the United Kingdom resulting in the bunkhouse remaining closed for an unknown number of months into 2021.

On the more positive side closure has not been all bad. The caretaker has been able to catch up on a backlog of maintenance, cleaning, and decorating tasks so the place is now in tip top condition just waiting to be used. Our finances are in a strong position thanks to substantial CV-19 related grants, low running costs, astute financial management by our treasurer and a very low wages bill-only our very part time caretaker is paid. In fact, there was no need for us to dig into our reserves; some of which have, since the foot and mouth epidemic some years ago when there was a long period of closure, been earmarked to sustain us in the event of a long time shut down at any stage in the future.

We are, however, looking to the future and investigating non-residential day use of our facilities possibly by local schools, community organisations, health & welfare groups and D of E, Scout and Youth organisations. We will also be re marketing the place as an excellent base for both mountain biking and cycling, which is something we have done in the past, but received little response.

I make no excuse for, as always in my reports, expressing my very sincere thanks to fellow trustees, volunteers, and Andrew our caretaker for their enthusiasm, time and expertise which ensures that the Chichester Youth Adventure Trust continues to function in a relevant, efficient and effective way and continues to be an excellent resource for the personal development of Young People and to the benefit of community, adult and family groups. Their collective vision and hard work have been recognised by the fact that Visit Wales (Welsh Tourist Board) categorised us as being in the top 10 best Welsh bunk houses and The Chichester Youth Adventure Trust has been nominated to receive the 2020 Community Award at Chichester City's Annual Awards' Ceremony in recognition of services to Young People from the Chichester area.

Honorary Treasurer's Report

The annual return was filed with the Charity Commission with trustee details updated.

The life expectancy of the existing UV 'filter' system was investigated and found to have been exceeded so it was replaced, and other work carried out to facilitate the cleaning of the pipework from the source at the spring to improve the water quality.

As regards the accounts, income from groups staying at the centre on a cash received basis was down by some £17,000 on the previous year due largely to CV-19 pandemic and the amount received in advance of the following year's bookings has decreased from £1,530 to £1,500, these all being bookings moved from 2020 to 2021 due to the CV-19 restrictions which limited the availability of the centre to a short period in the summer, since the first national lockdown in March 2020.

Fortunately, we have received support via the local authority in the way of grants totalling £15,000 since 1 April 2020 as well as a rates holiday for the year. To help reduce costs further we changed the bin collection to the free offering to charities.

As a result of the lack of use of the centre electricity and gas costs were also well down and so we have ended the year with a surplus of £6,187 a decrease on the previous year of only around £2,000.

We did not furlough our caretaker as it was important that we had someone nearby to keep an eye on the property and his time was directed towards carrying out the maintenance work that would usually be done by the autumn work party. Although the balance on deposit increased from £43,000 to £50,000, interest received fell owing to the drop-in interest rates as a result of the CV-19 pandemic.

The Calor Gas contract was renewed for a further three years but with no increase guaranteed for the first year, the insurers changed, and the electricity contract renewed for two years with an approximate increase on actual rates charged of about 12%, but not reflected in the accounts as we had a substantial credit balance refunded as usage was well down.

The reserves that we have will be enough for us to manage for approximately three years if we had no letting income at all, but the indications are that we are likely to be able to have people staying later in 2021.

Forms were completed to keep us an approved centre on West Sussex County Council's list.

Building Maintenance, fabric, furnishing and fittings

Due to CV-19 the only full working party to take place was at the beginning of March although the chairman has made 2 visits at appropriate points in the year.

- The building is in pristine condition as Andrew has been catching up on all the maintenance tasks while the place has been closed due to CV-19 This includes the painting of all high wear areas, & in particular the leaders' room, bedrooms, dining room, hallway, etc.
- Wood burner glass replaced with new clips at no cost to us.

- New UV water filter fitted, and water supply checked.
- Extra fire extinguishers added to existing ones to meet new fire safety requirements.
- New heat exchanger fitted to gas boiler at labour cost only. The boiler was 3 months over its 10-year warranty, but the warranty was extended due to the coronavirus.
- All annual checks have been completed and necessary work completed.
- Thorough cleaning has taken place & adaptions regarding use of the building to comply with CV-19 regulations, have been implemented.
- There was a break-in earlier in the year. Fortunately, nothing was stolen, but the intruder alarm was damaged and required substantial repair. The intruders gained access to the building by pulling apart, with the use of a vehicle, the lock securing the access gate. The old unbreakable combination lock and chain has now been replaced with an even more unbreakable one!
- An appropriate action plan has been arranged with the caretaker to ensure the bunk house is secure, weather tight and frost proof.

Outdoor Maintenance

Like the main bunkhouse, Andrew has continued to visit the site and has spent some time maintaining the outside area.

This work includes.

- Fire escape steps and porches painted.
- Gateway and fence at front of building painted.
- Front door treated.
- Grass cut and outside area tidied.
- Isolating & drainage valves fitted to external water pipes to facilitate draining & cleaning pipes & tanks.
- New hedge plants are growing slowly.

A fence running from the bunkhouse to the bike gate has been created to prevent the sheep from accessing the lawn area. This was to prevent the amount of sheep poo on the lawn, so that visitors can enjoy the space more, and to encourage the growth of various wildflowers and plants that would be happily munched by the sheep. A lawnmower has been purchased to replace the sheep and keep the lawn at the front and rear of the bunkhouse looking tidy.

Due to CV-19 restrictions during 2020, a number of the intended work and projects for the outdoor area of Tyle Morgrug has not been possible, these include:

- Tidy the felled Ash trees.
- Re surface final part of main driveway. This was discussed and agreed by the trustees to defer due to the financial outlay during the CV-19 lockdown.
- Replacing felled Ash trees with other mature trees to encourage conservation of the area.

We are also looking to plant and create our own woodland to create a "legacy forest" at Tyle Morgrug. Some initial discussions have been held with adjacent landowner who are supportive of the idea. Contacts are now being made to source funding for the tree planting. There are grants available, however the area may be too small for one. If this is the case alternative fund raising initiatives will be explored.

Bookings 2020

The bookings for 2020 were of course affected by the CV-19 pandemic. The year started well with eleven bookings from January to March, then the lockdown followed, with 23 cancellations. There was a brief respite from some of the regulations in August and September and a further three bookings from families were able to take place.

Of the 23 cancellations,

- 3 groups were refunded their deposits,
- 10 groups have rebooked for 2021 and 1 for 2022.
- 4 groups have yet to decide what to do with their deposit (one group has two bookings)
- 4 groups had not yet paid a deposit.

The lettings income for 2020 was £4803.

However, Tyle Morgrug is booked for New Year in 2021 and 2022!

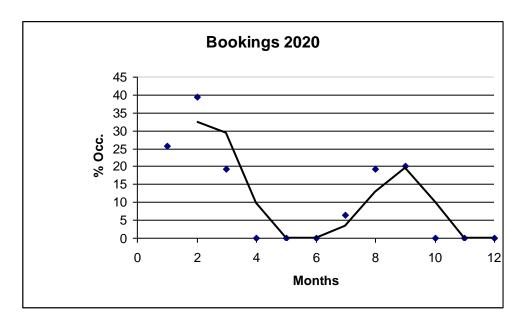

Most cancellations came from school and youth groups and their restrictions on residential activities, adult groups were more flexible in their hiring dates. The actual bookings were broadly driven by what was allowed during most of the year and not something that can be compared with past & hopefully future years.

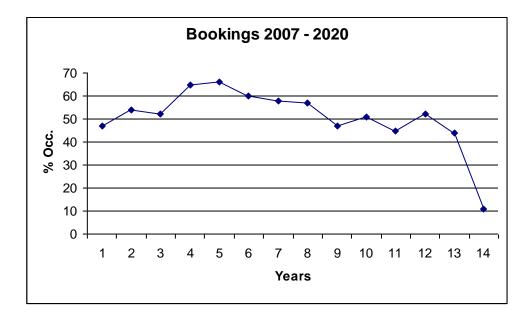

The thirteen year trend line has shown a steady decrease in occupancy by hirers over the past nine years and a fall for 2020 as CV-19 took its effect.

The bunkhouse website

Our website, <u>www.cyat.org</u> continued to contribute as a key way to connect with users of the bunkhouse in 2020.

The main updates to the website this year have been pandemic related:

- Introduced a banner on the website to provide a clear message regarding the pandemic relating to the bunkhouse. This was regularly updated to reflect the current guidelines.
- Added a CV-19 policy page detailing the steps and procedures taken when the bunkhouse was open.

We will continue to ensure the website reflects the latest guidance and have a process to enable the same message to be in place on all our literature.

Website performance

Traffic overview

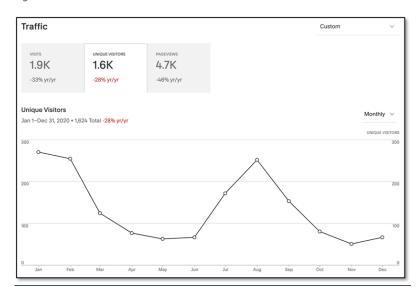
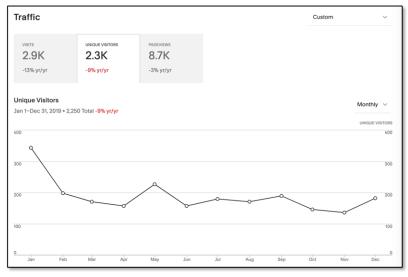


Figure 2: Jan 01 2019 – Dec 31 2019

The impact of the pandemic and measures taken by governments throughout the year have been reflected in the traffic we have seen to the website in 2020. This year we have averaged around 133 unique visitors to the website per month, with a total of 1,624 unique visits to the website in 2020 (figure 1). In 2018, we had 2,250 unique visits, so our numbers are down by about 30% on last year's numbers (figure 2). The 2020 graph shows a clear spike in visits to the site after the first lockdown completed, showing that interest in the bunkhouse is clearly there.

Figure 1: Jan 01 2020 - Dec 31 2020

2021 Plans

With residential visits restricted across the UK, which is expected to be in place for several months into 2021 & even when possible, the logistics & lead time organisations need to set them up, we are looking at alternative uses of the bunkhouse. The key area being explored is to promote the bunkhouse as a day visit centre for local schools, colleges, forest schools etc to use as their outdoor learning venue. This will provide a small income stream but will more importantly promote the bunkhouse to a wider clientele group who may go on to use it as a bunkhouse when allowed.

To make the outside area accessible for these groups, there are discussions underway as to what is needed to provide the right space and activities. For example, tarp shelter points to

provide a cover for groups, a fire pit and possible seating area, Orienteering points and course created, wildlife information boards positioned around the grounds etc

4 Trustees' Remuneration, Expenses and Benefits

No trustee or person connected to them received any remuneration or benefits during the year (2019: nil) A total of £315 (2019 £553) was reimbursed to seven (2019: seven) of the Trustees in the year. This was reimbursement for actual costs incurred in travel to and from the Cottage & Bunkhouse for work party weekends, subsistence and postage, telephone and stationery costs.

5 Risk Management

The Trustees have carried out a Risk Assessment audit of all the major risks relating to its operational base i.e. the Cottage & Bunkhouse. They actively review this on a regular basis, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to major risks.

6 Reserves Policy

The General Fund represents unrestricted funds arising from past operations.

The trustees aim to keep sufficient reserves to maintain services to hirers, to meet any unforeseen maintenance expense and to keep the property well maintained.

The aim is to keep at least one year's running costs in reserves

Additional reserves are in hand to meet the anticipated cost of upgrading the remaining section of the track estimated at £15,000 and the uncertainty as to when the Cottage and Bunkhouse will be able to reopen to its full capacity due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Restricted Income Funds are amounts received by way of grants and donations for specific schemes
